CLOSINGS FOR WRITING

CLOSE WITH ADVICE FOR YOUR READER:

Give some advice for the reader. Tell them something that they should learn or do about your writing.

CLOSE WITH HUMOR:

Can you think of something funny that happened about what you are writing about?

CLOSE WITH A QUOTE:

Quote a person in your writing.



CLOSE BY REWORDING THE BEGINNING:

Tell the reader the important information that was also in the beginning.

CLOSE WITH A PEELING:

Tell or show the reader how you feel about your topic or main idea.

CLOSE WITH A QUESTION:

Is there something you would like to leave the reader wondering?

CLOSE WITH A FACT:

Tell your reader an interesting fact you learned or know about your topic. You might surprise your reader.

OPENINGS FOR WRITING

OPEN WITH DIALOGUE:

Start a conversation between two characters.

OPEN WITH A QUOTATION:

Quote a person at the beginning of your writing.

OPEN WITH A SOUND:

Use an onomatopoeia to begin your writing.

OPEN BY DESCRIBING A CHARACTER OR SETTING:

Begin your writing using descriptive words to describe the character or setting.



OPEN WITH A QUESTION:

Ask the reader a question.

OPEN WITH A RIDDLE OR HUMOR:

Begin with a joke or something funny that happened about what you are writing about.

OPEN WITH A BOLD STATEMENT OR FACT:

Surprise the reader with a true statement.

WITH A FEELING:

Tell the reader some of your emotions about how you are feeling about your topic.

OPEN WITH A PERSONAL EXPERIENCE:

Begin by telling your reader about some of the experiences you had about your topic.
